Imagine slowly kayaking in a secluded bay with a group of visitors, sharing the story of how Raven stole the moon, sun and stars — a pod of humpback whales emerges nearby. This is a common experience for four cultural expedition leaders employed by Alaska Native Voices and working and living aboard one of Alaska Dream Cruises small, high-end tour vessels. Alaska Native Voices and Alaska Native Voices Educational Institute is recruiting now for these competitive positions.



Cultural heritage guides are also being recruited to reside in Gustavus and embark on large cruise ships and small tour vessels for one to two days to educate guests on the rich culture and history of the Hoonah Tlingit and Glacier Bay. Up to six individuals will become guides and will be immersed in the Huna ancestral homeland. Past guides speak of the spectacular beauty, the spirit of the land and sharing its power with guests across the world as a rewarding experience.

Cultural expedition leaders provide cultural lectures and educational presentations on the Tlingit, Haida and Tsimshian, as well as share personal experiences about living in Southeast Alaska. Beyond the ship you will lead kayaking and hiking expeditions in some of the most remote and beautiful wilderness locations on the planet. These tour vessels will embark on seven- to 14-day trips where guides will join passengers to visit most small towns in Southeast Alaska.

Huna Totem shareholders and their descendants, regardless of level of cultural knowledge or public speaking experience, are encouraged to apply. Two weeks of intensive training ensure guides and expedition leaders are prepared and confident in their positions. Cultural expedition leaders will receive an additional two weeks training in Sitka with Alaska Dream Cruises to prepare them for leading wilderness expeditions and for life on-board ship. ANV Facilitates Boeing Donation to Dance Groups

Cultural heritage guides make a profound impact on many of the visitors they encounter each season. "Our guides spend quality time with visitors and build meaningful relationships while sharing the beauty of our Native culture and place. This interaction has touched the hearts of many, enriching their experience visiting Southeast," said Mario Fulmer, visitor's program manager. "This connection is evident in the generous \$5,000 donation the Boeing Company made to benefit dance groups."

During the 2017 visitor season, Alaska Native Voices provided cultural heritage guide service to the Boeing Company's yacht, the MV Daedalus. The guide provided interpretive services and naturalist programming to Glacier Bay and hosted visitors at Icy Strait Point in

Hoonah. "The vessel made several trips throughout the season and crew and guests were moved by the warm welcome they received and the friendships forged during their stay," said Fulmer. "At the end of the season the Boeing Company approached Alaska Native Voices Educational Institute, as the affiliated nonprofit, to facilitate their donation to the arts specifically to Native dance troupes. It was an honor to assist Boeing to distribute the donated funds to the dance groups."

2017 Shareholder Settlement Trust Performance — A Letter from the Board Chair and the President and CEO

It is a pleasure to greet you in the new year. We are filled with hope, excitement and optimism for opportunities in 2018 and we are pleased to finish 2017 business with some good news stemming from the year's financial market performance. Your Huna Totem Shareholder Settlement Trust board of trustees met on February 6 and declared the third and final dividend for 2017 — more than \$1.1 million was mailed and direct deposited to unit holders on February 15, 2018, equating to \$12.59 per unit.

The trust distribution policy calls for 60 percent of the trust's net income to be distributed annually three times a year: on or before August 15, November 15 and the following February 15. Combined, 2017 distributions total \$17.09 per unit holder constituting a 167 percent increase over 2016 distributions from the trust.

We are excited the trust is working as designed — a set aside, diversified investment to fuel meaningful cash distributions to shareholders in perpetuity. More than \$54.4 million has been distributed since shareholders voted to create and become unit holders of the trust on September 23, 1994. The trust both protects and enhances investment

assets of Huna Totem, promoting the health, education and welfare of our shareholders.

Our continued goal is to create stable and growing dividends through improvement of trust policies that provide growth in trust assets. The 40 percent of annual trust income that is not immediately distributed is reinvested, increasing the trust balance and strengthening the potential for future returns that could benefit current and future generations of unit holders. Like the Elders before us, we take purposeful action today for the benefit of all the tomorrows.

As we consider the future generations of Huna Totem shareholders and trust unit holders, please remember — you can choose to have a percentage, or the entirety, of your annual dividends and distributions automatically deposited into your children's college savings plan. Vale was raised by his mother on the commercial fishing vessel, The Idle Hour. They traveled the region and called just about every Southeast fishing community home at one point or another. His mother is Tlingit from Yakutat and his father is from Arizona. Vale is a certified paramedic and fire fighter and previously worked as a paramedic in Anchorage and as a back-country ranger for Glacier Bay National Park. He also spent four years as a National Park interpretive ranger while working toward his bachelor's degree in cultural anthropology and communications.

Remembering Ernest "Judge" Hillman Jr. August 5, 1936 – February 23, 2018

Huna Totem shareholder Elder, cultural leader and former board member Ernest "Judge" Hillman Jr., walked into the forest Friday, February 23, 2018, at the age of 81. He was Eagle, *Chookaneidi* of the Iceberg House and his Tlingit name was *Chaas Kugu Eesh*.

"The Huna Totem Corporation family was profoundly saddened to learn of the passing of Ernie Hillman Jr.," said Russell Dick, Huna Totem president and CEO. "He was a lifelong advocate for Native people and will be forever missed."

Ernie was one of the 10 founding directors of Huna Totem, elected by shareholders on September 28, 1974. He served as a director continuously through 1982 and from 1983 through 2004. He contributed his leadership to the land selection committee, Shareholder Settlement Trust and Huna Heritage Foundation, among others during his tenure.

Former director Marlene Johnson was a lifelong friend of Ernie. "He was like a brother to me," she said. "We grew up next door to each other — this was before the Hoonah fire. We stuck together, in friendship and through our professional endeavors. I, like most people who knew him, am better from the experiences we shared. It was his good nature, smile and positive attitude that touched people."

"We faced at one time, with the rest of the board, legal counsel recommendations to file for bankruptcy," Johnson continued. "We made strong statements together about the significance of the land claims and that in no way would we

consider filing Chapter 11 and risk losing our precious land. Ernie was an integral part of developing new policy protecting Huna Totem land from ever being collateralized. He used to say, 'We have always been of this land and surrounding waters. Without it we don't have anything. We must save, and forever protect, the land for all the generations to come.' I'm sure going to miss him."

"The board and management extend their deepest condolences to Ernie's wife Lillian, to his children John, Ernie III, Veronica and Valerie and their families, and to the *Chookaneidi* Clan," said Edward Davis, Huna Totem board chair. "We are forever grateful for sharing your husband, father, grandfather and clan brother with all of us — his contributions to Huna Totem, the community of Hoonah and the Southeast region will be felt for generations."

"Our Elders, many who are now gone, and numerous shareholders have donated their photographs to Huna Heritage for the preservation of our collective history," said Amelia Wilson, Huna Heritage executive director. "The digital archives seeks to bring the preservation cycle full circle by providing access to the historic and cultural treasures held in the archives. The new resource site preserves, perpetuates and greatly improves accessibility to our recorded cultural and community history."

The expansive and dynamic resource was developed with Huna Totem shareholders and descendants in mind but the Huna

Tlingit culture," said Anthony Lindoff, board chair. "We have a dedicated, passionate and mission-driven board that recognizes the benefit of increasing our capacity and knowledge base to better serve our shareholders and descendants."

"The current trustees are in the process of reviewing the applications and we anticipate introducing the new trustees to shareholders very soon."

Trustees support the work of the foundation by approving the annual budget, audit reports and material business decisions. Members also serve as advisors to the Huna Heritage executive director and are ambassadors for the foundation in the community. Trustees serve three-year terms and meet as a board quarterly, receiving \$200 honorarium per meeting day.
